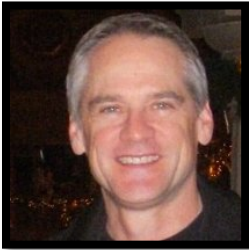


## Fresh Lifelines for Youth Board of Directors 2019-2020

His past experience includes: Vice President of Product Marketing & Finance at Apple, Senior Director of Products Finance at Apple, Director of Finance at Apple, and Finance Director of New Business at Lockheed Martin. After graduating with a degree in electrical engineering from Imperial College, London, Dick spent thirty years at Hewlett Packard Company, starting as a design engineer before moving into product management and rising to corporate vice president and member of the Executive Committee. At various times at HP his roles included general management with P&L responsibility for the Personal Computer Group and the UNIX systems business, both multi-billion-dollar revenue product lines, and head of worldwide sales for all of HP's computer products. He also sat on the boards of HP subsidiaries in Korea, Japan, and the Netherlands and a joint venture with LM Ericsson in Sweden. Dick left HP in 1998 and subsequently led early stage companies in the data storage, web hosting and product data management fields before retiring in 2005. He remains connected with the high-tech world, while devoting most of his time to non-profits. **Meera Chary**

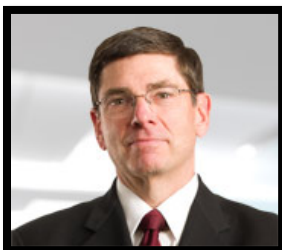

A native Californian of the Bay Area, Robert DeJesus graduated with distinction from San Jose State University with a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology. He was employed by the Santa Clara County Probation Department for over 30 years. With a strong desire to improve the lives of youth, he started out as a counselor in Juvenile Hall providing guidance, counsel and a compassionate ear. In 1991 he authored an article published in the American Probation and Parole Association (APPA) Perspectives quarterly on how to deal humanely and effectively with resistant youth in Juvenile Hall. Further, in 1999 as a supervisor, he convened and chaired a committee to develop the first ever Mission, Goals and Aspirations Statement for the Santa Clara County Juvenile Hall. In 2006, as a Probation Manager overseeing Juvenile Community Services, he assisted the State Corrections Standards Authority by becoming a grant evaluator for their Disproportionate Minority Confinement grant. In 2007, he presented for the OJJDP Conference in Denver, Colorado on Juvenile Detention Reform and Alternatives Initiatives. In January 2010, Robert presented in Austin Texas for APPA on Lessons Learned in DMC. In the latter half of 2010 Robert was promoted to Deputy Chief of the Institutions Division, bringing him full circle, back where he began.

Robert retired from Santa Clara County as the Assistant Chief Probation Officer where he helped oversee the entire Probation Department; including the Santa Clara County Juvenile Hall and William F. James Ranch, which implements one of the nation's few programs using a cognitive behavioral approach to rehabilitation. Finally, Robert's vision for a Juvenile Hall responsive to the risks and needs of the population is about to come to fruition

with the creation of a full service Assessment and Orientation Unit incorporating assessments conducted by the Probation Department, the Department of Mental Health, the Department of Alcohol and Drugs and the County Office of Education.

Robert received the Hispanic Heritage Leadership Award from the San Francisco 49ers. Robert has also been awarded the Honorable Kurt Kumli award of Distinguished Service from the Santa Clara County Superior Court for his contributions to the Juvenile Justice System. Robert was also presented with a Commendation by Board President Cortese on behalf of the Board of Supervisors for his work on behalf of youth and families.

He was a judge in Juvenile Court from 2006 until 2019, serving in both the Dependency and the Juvenile Justice Court. He was the Presiding Judge of Juvenile Court from 2008 until 2018, and supervised the Juvenile Justice Division from 2008 until 2017. Judge Tondreau served as a member and Chair of the Juvenile Court Judges of California, and was a member of the Family and Juvenile Advisory Committee of the

Judicial Council. He chaired a statewide Task Force on Juvenile Competency and a Task Force on Dually Involved Youth. Judge Tondreau served as the Dually Involved Youth Judge in Santa Clara County and chaired its Executive Committee from 2008 until 2019. He was a former President of both the Santa Clara Bar Association and the Silicon Valley Law Foundation. Throughout his legal career, he participated on numerous committees, projects and task forces, including the County's Human Trafficking Commission and the Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force.

*FLY's by-laws provide that board members are elected for a 1-year term with an option to then complete a 2-year term, followed by a 3-year term. After completing six years of service, "Alumni" board members may become part of FLY's committees. After completing a one-year hiatus they may rejoin the board.*
